Title: Short Story Module to enhance linguistic and communicative skills of students in English Language

Introduction: -

The "Short story module" is a process through which we can develop English language linguistic and communicative skills and acquire command of the language. We will be doing it through reading short story books every day and hardly one short story a day which may contain one to three pages which will help us to become more familiar with the language, increase our vocabulary and most importantly it will help us to gain confidence of communication in the language. Each and every student should become fluent in the English language as it is the language of bread and butter in the 21st century.

Aims & Objectives: -

- To improve linguistic skills of the students
- To enhance communicative skills of the students
- To make language classrooms more interesting
- To boost the reading habit among the students
- To motivate the students for self-study method

Hypothesis: Reading short stories in English Language will improve the linguistic and communicative skills of the students.

Research Methodology: - Experimental Method

Short Story Module: A small group of 50 students of UG classes of Arts Faculty were selected and they were given the task to read a short story a day loudly or silently. They were also instructed to learn five new words from the short story every day. This experiment continued up to thirty days. A Pretest and Post-test of the students was conducted. Sometimes students read the short story in the classroom or a student read aloud and others listened to it. Students also filled out an online questionnaire.

Limitations: - As students read short stories on their own a track record of their reading can't be kept. And this method can't be used every day in English language classrooms as it is time consuming.

Observation: -

- We have observed that those who were afraid of this language mostly belonged to the rural area or Marathi Medium Schools.
- 50% of the students preferred watching videos of the stories with subtitles rather than reading it.
- 20% of the students preferred listening to the short stories and only 20% of the students were interested in reading the short stories.
- 90% of the students informed they have improved their vocabulary which has boosted their confidence to speak in English language.
- 72% of the students stated they feel their communicative abilities have enhanced.

Literature Review: -

Ali Ahmed Ali Mansoor, in his research work says, he did a study to scrutinize the effect of a short story on developing students' vocabulary in Jalna District. It aimed to point out teaching and learning vocabulary through short stories. The test was used to identify the effect utilizing the short story for vocabulary retention. Ummul Nasiriyah says in her study, 'Being an important part of culture, literature should be included in foreign language teaching programs. As it is written for the native users of the language, it is an authentic material and presents good examples of target language. Reading literary works gives students great opportunities to improve their language.'

Conclusion: -

Although students were least interested in reading the short stories, they were interested in watching them in audio or video formats so it can be said that students are interested in short stories. They have improved their vocabulary and communicative skills (speaking and listening) at the end of the month. In addition to this a lot of improvement was seen in their critical thinking skills and set of values and ethics which were inculcated through the short stories. Learning process became more interesting and enjoyable as they learned on their own at their own pace and willingness.
