New Role of Language Classrooms: Laboratories of Soft Skills:

Hence language classrooms should not only stick to their former traditional pattern of teaching LSRW skills, grammatical skills, effective communication and presentation skills, vocabulary building, etc. but in addition to this teachers can focus on fetching students' attention to interpersonal skills, time management skills, leadership and team building skills, empathy skills, critical thinking skills, problem-solving skills, creative thinking skills, adaptability, conflict resolution, active listening skills, decision making, cultural competence, flexibility, goal setting, negotiation, patience, persuasion, positive attitude, problem analysis, crisis management, self-motivation, stress management, trustworthiness, diversity and inclusion, enthusiasm, patriotism, integrity, humility, taking initiative, innovation, resilience, strategic thinking, following work ethics, etc. The list is unending. However, the formula is simple and feasible in language classrooms.

Role of Literature in Acquisition of Soft Skills:

All forms of literature including major and minor forms like poetry, short stories, novels, plays, one-act plays, essays, etc. are power-packed with all the set of soft skills discussed earlier. The role of the language and literature teacher in the classroom will be in addition to focusing and concentrating on the development of linguistic, grammatical, and LSRW skills of the students, the teacher has to purposely discuss and elaborate the soft skills to the students with the help of short stories, novels, plays, poems and the major and minor characters, their journey of life, the lessons they have learned through the problems they have faced. Soft skills can also be illustrated with the help of the themes or denotative and connotative meanings of the literary piece.

Literature can be a powerful tool for teaching and enhancing soft skills in a way that is both engaging and insightful. Through character development, plot progression, and thematic exploration, literature offers readers (students in particular in this context) the unique opportunity to observe, analyze, and learn various soft skills indirectly. A set of soft skills can be acquired through all forms of literature.

Poetry:

'Sonnet 29' by William Shakespeare which talks about the common human trait of comparison and ignorance about self-possession can be used to teach the soft skills like critical thinking, self-motivation and optimistic attitude. Ninety-nine percent of the time throughout the day we are thinking about other people, on the contrary we should convert the thought process towards self-development by critically thinking or doing SWOC analysis. The teacher can explain to the students by giving the example of the protagonist from the sonnet who realizes at the end that his beloved is an invaluable treasure with him and that is his self-motivation to lead his life positively. The poems like 'Caged Bird' by Maya Angelou a metaphorical commentary about the racism, color discrimination, and slavery practices in America teach the students soft skills of equality, diversity and inclusion, cultural competence, etc.

Essays:

The essay 'On Saying Please' by A.G. Gardiner will help the teacher in the classroom to elaborate the soft skills like humility, courtesy, and effective communication skills in all walks of life. Two incidents are discussed in the essay by the author, the first one is when the passenger is punched by the liftman for not saying 'Please' and the second incident is when the bus conductor helps the narrator when he had forgotten his wallet at home, both the incidents can be used as an eye opener for the students to teach the importance of proper use of words to make communication effective as well the importance of soft skills like humility and courtesy in one's life which makes our personal and social life healthy and happy.

One-Act Plays

One-act plays like, 'The Swan Song' by Anton Chekov talk about the tragic ending of the stage actor in the theatre after giving his last performance on a bitterly cold night. The play conveys the soft skill of goal setting and prioritization and its importance in one's life. The one-act play 'Monkey's Paw' by W.W. Jacobs is a warning bell against lust and ill fate, nothing in life is free, we have to pay for everything in some form or other. It imbibes soft skills like problem analysis, and crisis management on the minds of the students.

Short Stories:

The story 'Romance of a Busy Broker' which is an apt commentary on the effect of industrialization on the life of a New York Broker can be used to teach the students the importance of Time Management as well as balance between Professional and Personal Life. The story 'The Thief' by Ruskin Bond transforms the life of the thief, Hari due to the honesty, pure heart, and kindness of his master Arun. He understands at the end of the story, the importance of education and honesty in life. This story will easily imbibe the importance of soft skills like trustworthiness, work ethics, humility, truth, honesty, integrity, cooperation, empathy, decision-making, etc. A short story, 'A Lesson in Humility' by Sudha Murthy in which Sudha Murthy herself learned a lesson, 'There is Grace in accepting too', teaches the soft skills of humbleness, empathy, cultural competence, and negotiation.

Novels: "Lord of the Flies" by William Golding, a novel that explores different leadership styles and the dynamics of group leadership under stress imbibes the leadership and management skills on the minds of the students.

The novel, "The Kite Runner" by Khaled Hosseini, a profound narrative that offers deep insights into the complexities of friendship, betrayal, redemption, and the capacity for empathy can be used to narrate the importance of empathy skills to the students.

"Pride and Prejudice" by Jane Austen offers lessons in misunderstanding, miscommunication, and the resolution of personal and social conflicts through the lens of romantic and familial relationships. In "The Alchemist" by Paulo Coelho, through the journey of the protagonist, readers learn about the importance of self-discovery, and perseverance, and how facing personal conflicts can lead to fulfilling one's destiny. Both these novels can be used to teach a very important soft skill to the students which is conflict resolution.

Plays: Girish Karnad's many plays reflect on the power and limitations of language as a means of communication. He examines how language shapes individual and collective identities, as well as the barriers it creates between people from different linguistic backgrounds. So, students through these plays acquire the soft skills of effective communication and presentation. Karnad also addresses the issues of social justice and marginalization, highlighting the plight of marginalized communities and individuals. He advocates for equality, inclusivity, and the recognition of the rights and dignity of all members of society. So, through these plays' students absorb the soft skills of inclusion, integrity, and resilience.

Conclusion:

These works of literature discussed above as examples, among others, serve as both compelling stories and valuable resources for personal development.
