On the **Threshold** of a **Century**



As the Peshwa City prepares to celebrate the centennial of the Shree Poona Gujarati Kelvani Mandal, **Tejas Gujarathi** takes note of the immense contributions of the Gujarati community to education in Maharashtra. Established in 1926, the institution's legacy extends far beyond its roots, leaving an indelible mark of educational excellence and social commitment





or those who are just catching up into the history of the Oxford of the East, the story of Shree

Poona Gujarati Kelvani Mandal has a special tome of its own. It all began on August 13, 1926, when a group of visionary leaders from the Gujarati community in Pune came together to create educational opportunities for their children. Steered by leaders such as stalwarts like Rao Bahadur Lallubhai Shah. Diwan Bahadur Dadu Bhai K. Desai, and others. they laid the foundation for an institution that would grow to shape thousands of young minds and become an indelible piece of Pune's history.

A stepping stone to making history

Come 1928, just two years after the Mandal's inception, the Sheth Shri Nathu Bhai Hukamchand Gujarati Primary School was inaugurated, marking the beginning of a journey driven by a relentless pursuit of educational excellence. This was followed by the establishment of Anglo-Gujarati the Vernacular High School in 1937, under the dynamic leadership of Acharya Dhansukhlal Dadawala, who transformed the Mandal into a centre of learning excellence.

A strong patronage

Generous patrons like Chunnilal Brijbhushan Mehta supported the Mandal's progress, contributing funds to purchase land for the high school in Kasba Peth. In recognition, the school was named Ratanben Chunnilal Mehta Gujarati High School (RCM). This school soon became a respected educational brand, shaping the futures of many students.



As the Mandal continued to grow, it adapted to the changing needs of the community. In 1941, the Sheth Hukamchand Ishwardas Gujarati Bal Mandir was established for younger students, and in 1944, the Sheth Motiram Laxmidas Commercial Institute was launched offer vocational to training. By 1960, the Mandal introduced technical education at RCM, anticipating the growing demand for skilled professionals.

Of milestones and markers

In 1975, the Mandal achieved another milestone with the establishment of the Acharya Shri Dadawala Junior College, D.B. providing higher education to students in Pune. This was a tribute to Acharya Dadawala's tireless efforts to expand educational in the opportunities region. By 1984, the Mandal's vision for further expansion led to the creation of the Shree Poona Gujarati Kelvani Mandal Senior College, which was initially housed within the high school.

With support from Sheth Ravjibhai Desai, the Mandal acquired land behind Shaniwarwada for the new college premises, which was named H.V. Desai Senior College of Arts, Commerce, and Science.

Tomorrow is here...


Today, the Mandal has expanded its offerings significantly. It now operates institutions such as the Smt. Sulochanaben Dhansukhlal Dadawala Technical School, the Smt. S.S.H. Bhagat Institute of Computer Technology, and English medium schools. Additionally, the Mandal offers postgraduate courses, autonomous journalism programs, heritage walks, Modi script training, competitive exam study centres, and Ph.D. programs. Preparations for its centennial celebration in 2026 are already underway.
